

After graduating from Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University (APU), he became aware of the issue of "undecided career paths" faced by students in correspondence and part-time high schools, and established the NPO D×P (now certified NPO D×P). He has been involved in career education programs as part of the regular curriculum at night and part-time high schools, as well as experiential learning programs and community support initiatives.

After stepping down as co-director of the organization in 2015, he began filmmaking and won awards at film festivals for his documentary works focusing on "women's menstruation." He has also participated in program production for BBC and Al Jazeera as a local coordinator, and serves as a board member of NPO Crossbase and an advisor for NPO IKUNO and Multicultural Flatto.
